Randall Stanley 20 January 2016 meeting

**January 20<sup>th</sup>** we were fortunate to have Mr. Randall Stanley the CTO of [Plus Location Systems](#) (Huntsville, Alabama) provide a presentation at our host facility [Bastion Technologies](#) (700 Boulevard South, Suite 405 Huntsville, AL). His presentation, "The Application of [Real-time Locating Systems \(RTLS\)](#) Technology to Provide Hazard Notification and Safety Analysis in Industrial Environments" was very well received. Randall provided an overview of the attributes and some possible uses for RF technology to locate, track and manage items. The logistical, safety, security and maintenance management aspects along with the technology which drives the system was explained from a risk management perspective. The turnout for this meeting was good, considering the poor weather conditions and construction on the parkway. The meeting was attended by 16 people (13 members and 3 guests).

Randall explained how RF Technology combined with sophisticated software could be used to track personnel, products, machinery, identify and quantify hazards, assess and improve productivity, security and safety. Randall extended an invitation to attendees to observe a mockup of the system and two members capitalized on this opportunity. The technology appears to have a multitude of uses of value to commercial companies and government agencies. Since [Army regulation \(AR\) 710-2](#) paragraph 1-1(a) requires the Army to use Automatic Identification Technologies (AIT) and this technology seems to meet and potentially offers extra benefits, it will be interesting to see if this technology is leveraged in the near future.

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The [Future Cities competition](#) was held at the [Davidson Center](#) (U.S. Space & Rocket Center), on Saturday January 16th, 2016 9:00 am-12:00 Noon Collaboration at 1:30 pm final awards at 4:30pm. ### **Fun stuff**

The majority of our membership has attended our monthly meetings and has probably noticed we generally have pizza as the lunch food item yet, how much do we know about pizza? Here are some fun facts about pizza:

- In 1835, Alexandre Dumas, author of *The Three Musketeers*, traveled to Naples, where he observed that the Neapolitan poor ate nothing but watermelon during the summer and pizza during the winter.
- The first pizza place in America was Lombardi's in New York City—originally a grocery store, Lombardi's started selling pizza in 1905.
- During the first few decades of the 20th century, pizza was predominantly eaten and sold by working class Italian immigrants.... But after World War II, American GIs came home from Italy with a craving for pizza, bringing the food to a broader consumer base for the first time.
- At first, pizzas were sold exclusively by the pie. But in 1933, Patsy Lancieri (of Patsy's Pizzeria in New York City) started selling pizzas by the slice—a trend that was quickly picked up by other pizzerias.
- Humans aren't the only ones who love the taste of pizza: there's even a mini pizza for dogs called the "Heaven Scent Pizza" made of flour, carrots, celery, and parmesan cheese.
- The first known Chicago deep dish pizzas were created in 1943 by the restaurant that later became the Pizzeria Uno chain.
- Domino's was founded in 1960. The restaurant chain's founder, Tom Monaghan, is one of three people in the world who hold an advanced degree in "Pizza-ology" from the "Domino's College of Pizza-ology"—a business management program he founded in the '80s.
- The first frozen pizza hit the market in 1962. It mostly tasted like cardboard until the genius food inventor Rose Totino got her hands on it.
- The Hawaiian pizza was invented in 1962 by Sam Panopoulos, a native of Greece who ran a pizza place in Canada.
- Pizza may have originated in Italy, but countries around the world have developed their own regional spins on the classic food. In Brazil chefs top their pizzas with green peas, the French love fried eggs on their slices, and in China a crust made of mini-hot dogs is surprisingly popular.
